TPA Approved And Now Available At Chowan Hospital

TPA (Tissue Plasminogen Activator) was approved for usage by the Food and Drug Administration on November 30, and has become available at Chowan Hospital. Cindy Coker, Chief Nurse of the Chowan Hospital Critical Care Unit, and Dr. Joe . Haskett attended a satellite teleconference at the East Carolina University School of Medicine on November 1 for an update on development and usage of the drug which has been used on an experimental basis in the United States for the past year.

According to Dr. Haskett. the release of TPA promises to expand the ability of community hospitals to treat and limit the damage done by heart attacks. In most heart attacks, a clot forms in one of the coronary arteries at the
