GREENVILLE - The North Carolina Symphony will combine forces with the East Carolina Symphony for a joint concert on the ECU campus Sunday, January 17. Renowned cellist Lynn Harrell will be featured soloist.

The concert, part of ECU's 1987-88 Artists Series, is scheduled for 3:15 p.m. in Wright Auditorium.
