
Jesus Christ was born to show us the way

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight" was the message God gave to John the Baptist. John also called people to confess their sins and to be baptized for the forgiveness of their sins. Along with many, Jesus came to be baptized by John.

When Jesus came up out of the water, he received the annointing of the Spirit and the voice from heaven, saying, "Thou art my beloved Son; with thee I am well pleased" (Mark 1:11). The Spirit and the words from heaven revealed to Jesus his assignment from God - to be the Messiah.

It is not enough just to worship the baby Jesus at this Christmastide. Just as Jesus grew to be the Messiah, we need to grow in our faith to allow our Lord to continue his ministry through us.

Carolina Courses Online bargain for NC residents

North Carolina residents can now take online courses at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for just \$147 each - a \$243 drop in cost from previous years.

"The reduction makes the program more accessible for North Carolina residents," said June Blackwelder, associate director for publications and promotions in UNC-CH's Division of Continuing Education,

"Because of new extension funding, the university received more money from the legislature to be used for extension teaching," she said. "As a part of this funding, we were able to reduce the fee from \$390 to \$147 for in-state resi-


