have included working with veterans seeking employment. He will get his first managerial experience overseeing the Edenton ESC office.

"I've never seen a day in the past 19 years that I've dreaded coming to work," Coltrain said. "I love what I do...I've never seen a day in all these years that I didn't enjoy my job."

Coltrain said he was aware, however, that replacing Keefe would not be easy.

"She left some big shoes for me to fill, I know," he said. "For one thing, everybody thought the world of her, and for another, she worked hard to get the office active in a lot of things such as local job preparedness programs with the school system...this is a very busy office."

He said that he is very impressed with the level of commitment that the Edenton ESC office has made to assist in a partnership effort with the Department of Social Services, the local schools and community college system to try to provide education and job

"I think it's a good thing, the way that all these people have joined forces to work together," he said, "because when you think about it, we're all trying to accomplish the same

thing...I definitely feel our office needs to be involved in those kinds of efforts."

Coltrain added that he also relished the opportunity to get involved in a community where everyone has already made him feel so at home.


