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added. "There are those times we can look back on when they wanted dad to be there to do things with them, and he couldn't because he was called out on an emergency...I'm sure a lot of you sitting here tonight can say the same."

Shaw said he was proud to see how the operation of rescue squads across the state had evolved over the years. In the 1960s, he recalled, rescue squads were lucky to have radios. And, he said, there was no such thing as a pager.

"They had to call you at your home, a restaurant ... wherever you might be," he said.

And, he added that it was not until the 1970s that hospitals began having emergency doctors on staff.

"Before that, you used to have to call a doctor at home and get him out of bed if you needed him," he said.

Shaw said that training for rescue squad workers took a giant leap around 1973, when basic emergency medical training (EMT) classes were begun. Then, in the 1980s, advanced life support became available.

"In the early days, basic first aid was the rule," he said. "We have certainly come a long way from there."

Good, solid training combined with a sense of dedication and a desire to serve is what makes a rescue squad unit successful, Shaw said.

"It takes dedication and it takes a desire to get the job done," he said. "If you don't have the dedication, you won't last long ... I have achieved what I have because my family and my God stood firmly behind

me....He will be there when the chips are down. He's always there to put that helping hand on you if you will just let Him."


