**PUBLIC NOTICE OF APPLICATION AND HEARING**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on October 26, 1999, Carolina Power & Light Company (CP&L) and Albemarle Pamlico Economic Development Corporation (APEC) filed a joint application pursuant to N.C.G.S. 62-36A, 62-110 and 62-159 and Commission Rules R6-90 through R6-94 for the following: (1) a certificate of public convenience and necessity to own and/or operate natural gas facilities as a public utility in the counties of Currituck, Camden, Pasquotank, Gates, Perquimans, Chowan, Washington, Tyrrell, Dare, Hyde, Pamlico, Jones, Carteret and Pender; (2) the exclusive franchises to provide natural gas in these counties; and (3) sufficient natural gas bond funds to pay for the uneconomic portion of the project proposed to be constructed to serve these 14 counties. The total cost of such a project is estimated to be \$197.5 million, and its negative net present value is estimated to be \$186 million.

Details of the application can be obtained at the Office of the Chief Clerk of the North Carolina Utilities Commission, Fifth Floor, Dobbs Building, 430 North Salisbury Street, Raleigh, North Carolina, where a copy of the application is available for review by any interested person. Upon written request, the Commission will place copies of the application and prefiled testimony in centrally located libraries. The written request should include the name and address of the library. The material may be copied without prohibition at the library.

The Commission has instituted an investigation into the application of CP&L and APEC for a certificate of public convenience and necessity and the exclusive franchises for natural gas utility service in the counties of Currituck, Camden, Pasquotank, Gates, Perquimans, Chowan, Washington, Tyrrell, Dare, Hyde, Pamlico, Jones, Carteret and Pender and into CP&L and APEC's request for gas bond funds to pay for the uneconomic portion of Phase One of the proposed project, (Currituck, Camden, Pasquotank, Gates, Perquimans, and Chowan Counties). A hearing has been scheduled to begin on Wednesday, April 12, 2000, at 9:30 a.m. in Commission Hearing Room 2115, Dobbs Building, 430 North Salisbury Street, Raleigh, North Carolina, for the taking of public witness testimony and the testimony of the Applicants, the Public Staff, and other intervenors. It will continue as necessary until conclusion of the case.

Persons desiring to send written statements to inform the Commission of their positions in the matter should address their statements to the North Carolina Utilities Commission, Post Office Box 29510, Raleigh, North Carolina 27626-0510. Written statements are not evidence unless those persons appear at a public hearing and testify concerning the information contained in their written statements. All correspondence should reference Docket No. G-44.

The Public Staff of the Utilities Commission, through its Executive Director, is required by statute to represent the using and consuming public in proceedings before the Commission. Statements to the Executive Director should be addressed to Mr. Robert P. Gruber, Executive Director, Public Staff - North Carolina Utilities Commission, Post Office Box 29520, Raleigh, North Carolina 27626-0520.

The Attorney General is also authorized to represent the using and consuming public in proceedings before the Commission. Statements to the Attorney General should be addressed to The Honorable Michael F. Easley, Attorney General of North Carolina, c/o Utilities Division, Post Office Box 629, Raleigh, North Carolina 27602-0629.

Any person desiring to intervene in this docket as a formal party of record should file a petition under Commission Rules RI-6, RI-7, and RI19 not later than Tuesday, February 15, 2000. These petitions should reference Docket No. G-44 and be filed with the North Carolina Utilities Commission, Post Office Box 29510, Raleigh, North Carolina 27626-0510. Guidelines for discovery that will be applicable to all intervening parties were established by the Commission in its order scheduling the hearing in this docket. The testimony of all intervening parties to this proceeding must be prefiled no later than Thursday, March 23, 2000.
