Among those are landscaping classroom carpeting, a school sign, an extended bus canopy, a student-

learning kitchen and fencing.

The cost of the remaining items totals almost \$193,000 and those items will be prioritized as needed, Smith said.

However, a contingency in the amount of \$386,000 could be used to pay for those items, he said.

"We will look back (at the possi-

bility of including the items) and we may use the contingency fund to accommodate them, but we probably can't (afford) to do them all," Smith said.

Certain items such as landscaping could probably be done by the school system, Smith added.

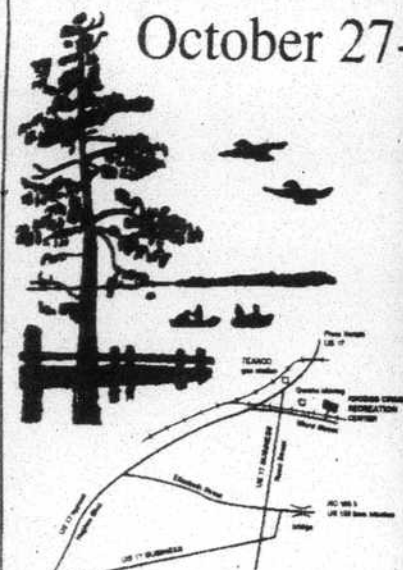

"We invite you to join us in participating in the Sound Country Celebration's Antique Show and Sale," said Wilkerson. "This event is expected to attract individuals from across the country. Tour group buses are scheduled to arrive along with the crowds of individuals expected from local counties and Virginia. This is a one-day show but in light of the anticipated turnout it will be worth your while."

The show, Wilkerson noted, "will feature vendors with heirloom quality crafts, artwork and displays from master gardeners and nurseries."
