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Wildlife Commission launches new small game program in NC

RALEIGH, NC - The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission is launching a massive program aimed at restoring the state's bobwhite quail and other small game populations.

Commission Chairman John E. Pechmann of Fayetteville, NC says \$1 million is being set aside to fund the first year of the project which he feels could be "one of the most important in the commission's history."

The Wildlife Resources Commission has had marked success in restoring and managing populations of whitetail deer, wild turkeys, black bear, striped bass and trout. But quail populations have continued to decline.

Pechmann says the commission

has approved a plan, proposed by Game Management Division Chief Dr. David Cobb, calling for major reorganization, expansion and redirection of that division.

Under the program, teams of wildlife biologists and technicians will be assigned to "focal areas" in Western, Piedmont and Coastal counties to establish small game projects.

This will involve working with local landowners and organizations and agencies concerned with wildlife. Incentives could be made available to private landowners cooperating in the project.

In addition to reassigning priorities of present game management and forest stewardship personnel, Dr. Cobb has been authorized to add seven

and a half new positions for the program.

The Wildlife Commission has authorized \$1 million from accrued interest in the Wildlife Endowment Fund to cover the first year's cost of the project.

Dr. Cobb estimated it would cost \$761,395 the first year and drop to \$643,395 the second.
