Approximately 100 people gathered Monday morning at the Veterans Memorial to honor Edenton's fallen heroes. Veterans from WWII, Korea and Vietnam stood at salute as Tom Dyson sweetly and sadly played taps.

County Commissioner Louis Belfield delivered a memorial address for those assembled.

The following excerpts from Mr. Belfield's message which more than express the passion and gratitude of those who can live in the "land of the free" due to the sacrifices of others.

'Greater love has no man than to lay down his life for his friends (John 15:13). So today, we thank you in words that forever seem so inadequate ... "


George Stokes of the Edward G. Bond Post 40 American Legion served as master of ceremonies during the tribute to fallen veterans.

Gaylord and Spencer were members of a rival group, Cacalacky Crime Family, or CCF.

Police have said Powell's murder was the result of an argument between members of the group.


