The N.C. Board of Transportation recently awarded a contract to replace the bridge over Rocky Hock Creek along Rocky Hock Road.

The \$820,000 contract was awarded to Carolina Bridge Company Inc. of Orangeburg, S.C. Work and work is scheduled to begin in July with completion set for November.

"Bridges throughout this area are a vital part of our state's transportation system,"

## **Proposed tax** hikes part of town, county budget drafts

Edenton Town Manager Anne-Marie Knighton and Chowan County Manager Cliff Copeland have both called for property tax hikes in their proposed budgets sent to councilors and commissioners late last week.

Both Knighton and Copeland cited such projected increases as spending for fuel and insurance costs as reasons for calling for the rise in the tax rates. Copeland said increases in worker's compensation costs, \$231,000 in additional EMS spending, and \$300,000 in matching funds for a recreational facility grant also

### Teacher won't be returning to class this fall

BOE declines to renew contract of educator under investigation

A John A. Holmes High School teacher under investigation by Edenton police for alleged pornographic material on his home computer, as well as an alleged incident involving a female student, did not have his contract renewed for the next school year by the Edenton-Chowan Board of Education on Monday night.

The teacher in question will not be returning to the classroom at Holmes in the fall, Superintendent Allan Smith said Tuesday morning.

'The board voted (unani-

mously) to not renew his contract for next year," Smith said, adding that teachers who do not have "career status" with public schools in North Carolina have their contracts renewed on a year-to-year basis.

The teacher's official last day as an Edenton-Chowan school system employee is June 13, spokesperson Glenda Jakubowski said Tuesday. He was suspended from the school system in mid-May when the investigation began. He began working at Holmes in the fall.

The teacher's home computer was confiscated by police following an incident at a local restaurant on May 13, when he allegedly approached a female student from Holmes and engaged in what officials have characterized as potentially inappropriate conduct.

Police Det. Sgt. Rhonda Copeland said Monday that officials at a State Bureau of Investigation lab in Raleigh were still conducting tests on the teacher's home computer which had initially been taken to an SBI lab in Greenville following the May 13 incident.

"We're still waiting on (getting) information back on that (computer)," Copeland said. 'We hope to hear something back this week."

As of press time, the teacher had not been charged with any

Copeland has not ruled out the possibility that the teacher could be charged, pending the outcome of the search for child pornography material on his home computer.

Smith said Monday that he was aware of the police inves-

tigation and search of the teacher's computer. He declined to comment when asked by-The Chowan Herald about any concerns he might have about the search for child pornography on the teacher's computer.

"It wouldn't be appropriate for me to respond; there's an investigation going on," Smith

Smith also declined to comment on why the school board essentially terminated the teacher before the investigation was finished.

"I can't get into those personnel issues," he said.

Several attempts to contact the teacher have been unsuccessful. He did not reply to an email left at his email address at Holmes last month and he has an unlisted phone number.
