

They are wanted on a variety of felony charges — anything from passing a bad check to possession of narcotics.

The majority of them are men in their 20s and 30s who are from Edenton. The few who are not native are on the list for crimes committed locally

Some of them are repeat offenders. And a few of them have been under investigation for several years.

Police chief Greg Bonner said that there are no real common threads linking the persons on Edenton's most wanted list other than that — they are at large and wanted

This is the first publically-released wanted list from the police department in many years.

Typically a generic list of those locally-wanted persons is posted in local law enforcement offices.

But Bonner hopes that by releasing the information that residents will help lead

police to those on the list.

He was indicted by a grand jury recently on charges of felony inciting to riot, possession of a stolen firearm, possession of cocaine, carrying a concealed gun, resisting a police officer and assault on a police

Parents contacted about large number of flu outbreaks in school

Talk that a flu epidemic was sweeping through the local elementary schools last week was exaggerated, but not entirely baseless.

Nearly 80 students, or eight percent of the elementary school population, many suffering from flu-like symptoms, did not show up for class on Thursday. The numbers had been fluctuating for a few days prior, between 50 - 60 per day, school representatives said. By Monday the numbers were back down in the 60s.

According to school nurse Angie Layton, several of the children were reported to have influenza B, in addition to a variety of other illnesses.

Typically student absences range from 7,-30.

This year's absences re-

main quite low compared to five years ago when there were a large amount of flu and bronchitis cases in the elementary schools, Layton noted.

Pasquotank and Perquimans counties also saw a large number of students, mainly in the lower grades, calling in sick last week, due to flulike symptoms, officials with the local health system said. But officials denied any sort of "outbreak" in the area.

"The bad thing about this is that a lot of kids don't get the flu shot," Layton said.

"Vaccinations are recommended for asthmatics, diabetics, and seniors, not for healthy kids. And because the flu is a respiratory virus spread through the air, it spreads quickly."

For those students left in Chowan elementary schools, many of them enjoyed videos featuring "Dr. Coughs A Lot" and his quick-witted messages of health safety — coughing into the elbow and washing one's hands often.

The teachers also took precautions to ensure the health of their students by disinfecting the classrooms.

Letters were also sent home to parents.

The rise in local absences happened one day after an outbreak in Hyde County that closed three of the county's schools after 20 percent of their students fell

National reports said last year, 47 children under age 18 died from influenza around the country. In 2003-2004, the worst recent flu season, 153 children died.

According to the Center for Disease Control approximately 36,000 people die from the flu each year.

But so far federal health officials have considered this year a mild one.
