

would have enabled the town to hire a consultant to work with the Planning Board, the Recreation Ad-

It would also have provided an opportunity for the town to work collaboratively with the county to develop a bike path and declined to endorse a reso- visory Board, and citizens trail that would have con-

nected rural parts of the county with Edenton - for instance, from West Queen Street to the new fishing pier at the Chowan River

Knighton noted that every time she talked with DOT about getting a bicycle path established, "they say, you need a master plan".

If funded, the town would

have received \$28,000 in grant funds and would have been required to contribute \$7,000 in matching funds.

The town had already received an endorsement from the Albemarle Commission's Rural Transportation Planning Organization in support of
