County officials: Residents must post address numbers visibly

Chowan County officials are spreading the word about a county ordinance that requires every owner of improved property to post the official addresses at the property. The ordinance is not new. In fact, it took effect 20 years ago. It applies in

all areas of the county that are not within the corporate limits of the Town of Edenton.

County officials recently have received reports from some firefighters and emergency medical service personnel about houses that do not have the address posted in compliance with the ordinance.

County Manager Kevin Howard said Monday that there has not been a major catastrophe because of an un-posted address, but fire departments and EMS have reported having difficulty finding some locations because of absent numbers.

The county's address visibility ordinance was adopted in 1993, around

the same time the county went to countywide road names.

The ordinance took effect in January 1994.

For now, county officials are just making an extra effort to get the word out about the address posting requirement.

But Howard said eventually there would be a renewed emphasis on en-

forcement.

"We hope that everybody will go ahead and comply with it, but then at some point in time we are going to have to start enforcement activities," Howard said.

The ordinance requires address numbers to be at least three inches high in order to be seen easily from the road. If a build-

ing is more than 75 feet from the road, the address number must be displayed on a sign in front of the building and at the end of the right-of-way. The number must be readable from the road.

Address numbers are required to be plain block numbers and to be set against a background of a contrasting color.

The answers to those questions, Jackson said, will provide him with a road map to be used in moving the school system forward.

One of his goals, he said, will be to personally visit every church in Chowan County and get to know the people who attend services there.

He has already met with a local civic group and the Chamber of Commerce board, and has visited the Cubbie-Mobile, where White Oak teachers and teacher assistants are volunteering their time to distribute 3,000 donated books for young children's summer reading pleasure.

Jackson said he would make good use of social media such as Facebook

and Twitter. He said he remains excited about the school system's goal to put electronic devices in the hands of students.

He described his approach to education as very "child-centered" and based on determining what works best for students. Jackson said that he also believes strongly in building positive relationships based on treating others the way he would like to be treated.

Jackson said his passion for education has been deeply influenced by his favorite elementary school teacher, Jackie Parham, with whom he is a Facebook friend today. She still sends him messages, he said, telling him she is proud of him. That means a lot, he said.

Prior to coming to Chowan County, Jackson and his family lived in Union County where he served as the chief communications officer on the Union County Public Schools Superintendent's Executive Cabinet.
