ARRIS TAKES OATH OF OFFICE AT HISTORIC COURTHOU

eader Harriss took the oath of office Friday as the 1st Judicial District's newest district judge in a special session of court at the 1767 Chowan County Courthouse.

Judge Chris Bean administered the oath in his final official act as a district court judge.

Harriss was elected in November in an uncontested race.

Bean said it was nice change of pace to have a brief and pleasant session of court.

"It is very nice that we can have a relatively short session of court and a happy session of court," Bean said near the conclusion of Friday's ceremony.

About 125 people - mostly representatives of the legal and law enforcement communities from across the district and business and civic leaders from Edenton packed into the Colonialera courtroom to witness Harriss's oath of office.

"This is a position of honor and trust and this is something that I do not take lightly," Harriss told the crowd after taking the oath.

Bean, citing an article written by a district court judge in one of the state's other districts, noted the range of cases heard by a district court judge, including criminal, juvenile, and family cases.

Harriss stressed the importance of fairness.
