Council casts wary eye to solar plan

A letter of intent prepared for a proposed solar fann lease agreement at the Northeast Regional Airport in Edenton failed to receive authorization from the Town Council during its Feb. 10 monthly meeting.

Mayor Roland Vaughan echoed the sentiment of several council members that at this point they had more questions they felt needed to be addressed.
