Wildlife officer earns top honor from bowhunters

N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission Sgt. Brad Stoop has been named the top law enforcement officer in the state by N.C. Bowhunter's Association.

Stoop. a Perquimans County resident. has worked for the wildlife commission for 15 years. His district includes Perquimans, Chowan. Pasquotank and Gates counties.

The awards ceremony was held Feb. 28 in Raleigh. Stoop estimates about 100 to 125 people attended.

The bowhunters association was founded in 1975 and started honoring law enforcement officers in 1992. Stoop was selected by the wildlife commission to represent District 1, a 13-county tin County and as far cer for the award.


