Town responds to power outage

Town of Edenton utility customers east from Village Creek to Sandy Point experienced a power failure Monday afternoon.

Utilities Director Glenn Andersen said an insulator failure prompted by a burning power line caused the outage. He said that arcs of blue flame could be seen by town linemen as they responded to the scene and that flickering lights were experienced as far away as the downtown area.

The outage was reported about 11:15 a.m. near Pelikan and power was restored at about 1:30 p.m., Andersen said.
