

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Energy assistance applications available at DSS starting Dec. 1

The Chowan County Department of Social Services would like to inform of the current poverty level Chowan County residents that applications for the Low Income Energy Assistance Program will begin Dec. 1 and continue through March 31 or until funds are depleted.

Applications for elderly persons age 60 and above or disabled persons receiving services through the Division of Aging and Adult Services will be taken from Dec. 1-Dec. 31. Any remaining funds will be used for other eligible households beginning January 1, 2016 through March 31, 2016 or until funds are depleted.

To be eligible, a household must be vulnerable at the time of application. A household is vulnerable if it is subject to rising cost of heating, has a heat source and is billed separately for over or disabled persons rethe heat expense. Households must meet income Division of Aging and Adult eligibility. If the total house-

hold members' countable income for the base period (month prior to application) is equal to or less than 130% and the household members' countable resources are \$2200 or less as of the date of application, the household may be eligible for LIEAP.

If a household is found eligible for assistance through the Low Energy Assistance Program, vendor payments will be paid directly to the heating provider for electric. gas, kerosene, fuel oil, etc.

Applications will be taken Monday through Friday from 8:30-11:30 a.m. and 1-4 p.m.

During the month of December (or until funds are exhausted) applications will be received at the Chowan County Department of Social Services office on Freemason Circle in Edenton from persons age 60 and ceiving services through the Services.
