man Jeff Smith, also a Democrat, said there had been both pros and cons to having two different people represent the county in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Jones and Butterfield were both representing parts of the county, Chowan officials had two people in the House advocating for their concerns.

But on the other hand, Smith said, "it's always better to have one person to be your contact and have one person to talk with."

Chowan Commissioner Keith Nixon, a Republican who is vicechairman of the board and has served previously as chairman, said he thought it would be better

On the one hand, he said, when for the county to have all its voters casting their votes in a single congressional district.

"I think it's better when one county is under one person, especially a county as small as we are," Nixon said.

Nixon said he didn't have a problem with either one.

"I think both of them will do fine," Nixon said. "But I just think it's better for the county to be under one person to prevent confusion for the people when they are voting.

Church that she had noticed some changes in the water during the past few years and that she and other members of CEEG had wanted to learn more about what was going on in terms of water

One of the concerns has been the prevalence of bluegreen algae in the Chowan River and its tributaries during the past year.

Elizabeth Fensin, an algal ecologist with the water sciences section of the N.C. Division of Water Resources, brought the forum audience up to speed on the past 15 years of algae research in the Albemarle Sound and its tributaries.

Fensin said that over the years that hadn't been much algae observed in the Chowan River. In most years there might be two or three reports of algae blooms in the Chowan and those events are short-lived, she said.
