When it came to the fourth condition - that the project would be in "harmony" with the surrounding property, Commissioner Kyle Jones voted he wasn't convinced it

After the vote on the four issues, the board had to take a final vote on the project as whole and give it a thumbs up or down.

"They boxed themselves into a corner," said Leary Winslow, one of the opponents of the Timbermill Wind project. He was referring to how could a commissioner could vote "yes" on the overall project when they had voted "no" on one aspect of it.

A sixth commissioner, Matt Peeler, was recused from voting because a majority of the board said he had shown he'd already made up his mind before the hearings started. Peeler has been an opponent of wind power. He

was there Monday night, but sitting in the audience instead of with his fellow commissioners.

"I thought of a lot of ways this (vote) could go, but I didn't see this one coming," Peeler said.
