

His willingness hoist more threes, and his ability to make them at roughly the same rate he has in year's past, has kept defenders honest at the top of the key.

This has allowed the Hornets to consistently run the high-ball screen, an offensive concept that was seemingly created for a ball-handler like Walker.

The on-ball defender, even when he knows the pick is coming, is forced to try and fight over the screen or switch who he is defending. If he fights over the screen, good luck trying to catch up to a cutting Walker.

If the on-ball defender switches, this most often leaves an opposing team's big man trying to guard Kemba. The result being what you would expect when a lumbering 6-feet, 11-inch man tries to keep himself between the basket and a quick and crafty 6-feet, 1-inch All-Star.
