RALEIGH — Insurance Commissioner and State Fire Marshal Mike Causey announced that the Center Hill-Cross Roads Fire District was awarded a \$30,000 grant through the 2019 Volunteer Fire Department Fund from the State of North Carolina.

The check will be mailed to Fire Chief Lewis Nixon to be used by the Department to purchase needed equipment. The equipment is purchased using matching funds and must be approved by the Department of Insurance Office of State Fire Marshal.

"Fire and rescue organizations protect our communities large and small across North Carolina, but sometimes their budgets don't grow with their responsibilities," Commissioner Causey said. "Our emergency service personnel should be supported with the best equipment and supplies. and supplies needed to do their jobs correctly and safely.

"I know the Center Hillwill use this money to serve their community even better," Causey added. "Thank you, Chief hard work and thanks to your dedicated staff."

Chief L.W. Nixon said the grant means a great deal to the department and fire departments across the community.

Center Hill-Cross Roads Fire District has received a total of \$13,808.32 from the Volunteer Fire Department Fund in the past 31 years since the program began. The General Assembly created the Volunteer Fire Department Fund in 1988 to help volunteer units raise money for equipment

The grant funds must be matched dollar-for-dollar for an amount approved up to \$30,000, unless the depart-Cross Roads Fire District ment receives less than \$50,000 per year from municipal and county funding, in which case the applicant shall match \$1 for each \$3 of Lewis Nixon, for all of your grant funds up to \$30,000.
