Tarboro, the No. 1 seed in the 1AA NCHSAA east, had been a roadblock for the No. 2 Aces in the East Regional final in 2017 and 2018 and the same stayed true Friday night.

Edenton saw its season come to an end with a 35-6 loss to a Vikings team that has won 44 straight games.

"Tarboro's a great football team," John A. Holmes head coach Paul Hoggard said. "They haven't lost a game in three years for a reason."

Tarboro (14-0) received the opening kickoff and went 68 yards in three plays for the opening score.
