SOME STARTLING FACTS FARMERS OF CHEROKEE AND ADJOINING COUNTIES

Are there two sides to the question of growing a tobacco crop? Yes. Here are some of the challenging facts. What did you make off your farm last year? You answer, "Nothing but a bare living, and I had to work on public jobs to get any extra money to pay taxes, etc." What did you sell from your farm product last year? Your answer, "Let me see, I sold a few things, that I found that I am going to have to buy this year before my summer vegetable and garden stuff comes in; and I haven't the money to buy these."

In answer to this deplorable fact, did you ever think that the farmers of other sections have owned combined crops and cash markets, just as we are doing in growing a combined white Burley tobacco crop this year? There farmers have bank accounts, their own cars, many of them, and do not have to go to town and beg people to buy their stuff. Most of us here in Cherokee and adjoining counties are going to town with empty wagons—nothing to sell—everything to buy. We come back from town, with a defeated feeling, a loaded wagon, with an empty pocketbook. We sigh and say, "What is the use of living on the farm, anyway. We are slaves to the man with money." This is not exaggerating, for we must have money to buy groceries, clothing, home supplies, farm supplies, etc. How are we to solve this problem as farmers? You ask, "Is there any way to solve it? Is there any hope for us mountain farmers to become prosperous and independent?" Our answer is fair, sane and based on facts. Here they are: You can grow a white Burley tobacco crop with this Association this year. You can have every economic certainty that it will bring you cash this fall, for we know that the tobacco supplies of the last two years are very low. You need not be experienced in growing tobacco to successfully grow a sun-curing tobacco. We have a limited supply of the large white Burley seeds. They are not plentiful. We have several seed dealers. See them or us.

Lone Mail Bandit Gets Registered Package; Escapes Amid Bullets

New York, Feb. 26.—Postal inspectors and railroad police today declared last night's robbery of mail pouches, on a Chicago train with through mail from San Francisco, by a lone bandit was the third that took place on the same train within two months.
