Messrs. John Cole and Aaron Gladson returned to the Owensby saw mill Sunday.

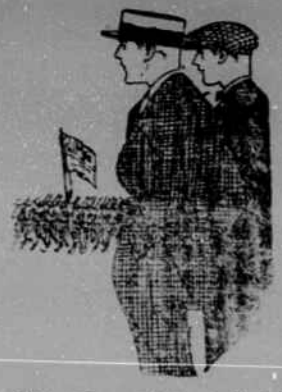
The mother of Mr. John Abblew is very sick.
