MISSBERRY ANNOUNCES NEW UNDERTAKING (Continued from page 1) general introduction of credit unions: (1). Farmers should be able to buy all farm supplies in large quantities, as manufacturers do, and get the benefit of what is known as a quantity price—that is a lower price for large purchases than for small ones. (2). If the farmers can get credit as cheap as the middleman he can afford to hold and dispose of all own produce throughout the year and therefore will be able to secure uniform distribution and prevent the price depression which large, early sales have forced upon him. (3). The habit of working together will take the place of each acting for himself. The team work of a whole community working in co-operation will help each farmer to accomplish what he would be helpless to gain by himself. Miss Berry is well known to the people of North Carolina as one who has devoted her whole life to public service. For many years she was secretary of the State Geological and Economic Survey, having been placed in administrative charge of the department for the three years while the State Geologist was in the army. In connection with the work of this department she was acting secretary of the State Good Roads Association, the North Carolina Drainage Association, the North Carolina Fisheries Association, the American Association of State Highway Officials, and the Southern Appalachian Good Roads Association. In 1917, she succeeded in getting drafted at the State Road Convention at Wrightsville, a resolution favoring a State system of highways and in the Legislature of 1919, working with Senator Seales, of Guilford and Senator Stevens, of Buncombe, drafted a State Road Law which carried practically all of the provisions of the law which was finally enacted in 1921. During 1919, and 1920, Miss Berry built up the North Carolina Good Roads Association until it had six thousand members in every county of the State and

conducted an intensive campaign of education and organization which resulted in the enactment of the present State Road Law with an initial appropriation of fifty million dollars for construction and about two million dollars per year for maintenance of a State system of Highways of about 6,100 miles of road.

At the 1923 legislature Miss Berry succeeded in getting additional fifteen million dollars for continuing this constructive program. It is a matter of keen gratification to Miss Berry to know that many other States are now adopting the North Carolina plan and that at national meetings of highway officials the North Carolina State Highway Commission is referred to as the most efficient in the entire country. In addition to the work she did in these various capacities, Miss Berry was chairman for women in Orange County in all Liberty Bond campaigns and the War Savings Stamps drive and as a result of her work received a special letter from Mr. Carter Glass, Secretary of the Treasury, commending her for having placed Orange County "on the top" every single time. Orange is one of the few rural counties in the country to enjoy this distinction. Miss Berry was also chairman of the committee on women in the industry of the State Council of Defense and represented North Carolina at a conference of the American Association of State Geologists called by President Wilson in Washington in 1918 for a discussion of the problem of locating sources of supply of certain minerals, which were vitally needed in the successful conduct of the war. As secretary of the North Carolina Geological and Economic Survey, she compiled and published numerous statistical reports relating to minerals, drainage and road work in North Carolina and edited and indexed several large scientific volumes which have been printed and distributed by the State Survey. As secretary of the North Carolina Good Roads Association, she conducted the most intensive and efficient campaign for a State system of highways that has ever been put over in the State for any other

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cause. During the past year she has been on the staff of the Greensboro Daily News as Editor of a department of North Carolina Industries and in this connection, did considerable work in connection with the agricultural industries of the State. Miss Berry will bring to bear on this new and most difficult undertaking all energy, skill and experience with which she is known to be so abundantly supplied and it is felt that her work will have far-reaching results for North Carolina. She will address the North Carolina Press Convention at Blowing Rock this week on "Credit Unions and their value in North Carolina Agricultural Development."

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
