COTTONSEED MEAL IS SAID TO BE CHEAP FEED

With Cheaper Ration for Work Stock and Add Protein, Reports Earl Hostetter

RALEIGH, Aug. 14. — If the work animal can be made to eat cottonseed meal, it will cheapen the ration for work stock and will add protein to the ration, reports Earl Hostetter, who has made some interesting experiment, with this material on the work animals belonging to three of the branch station farms of the State College and Department of Agriculture. Mr. Hostetter says that the feeding value of this material to work animals has long been a question in the minds of farmers, but now the station has tried it out for six years and finds that there is no doubt as to its use as a feedstuff.

He says: "Some of the animals under our tests polished as much as one and one-half pounds each daily their other grain, but when refused to eat even as much as one-half pound daily. It is worth while to note that none of the animals fed the cottonseed meal seemed to suffer for any bad results and several of those under tests were kept in the experiment for the entire period. "The greatest advantage and about the only one in using the meal is that it cheapens the ration slightly and this will always be true in North Carolina on account of the good home supply. Both mares and males were used in the test and in all cases the cases relished the ration much more than the males."

USE GOOD SEED OATS THIS FALL

Dr. Winters Urges Growers to Think More About Home-Grown Seed

RALEIGH, Aug. 20. — It is time to think of planting this fall crop and many farmers have not yet begun to plan for the fall crop, says Dr. R. Y. Winters, plant breeder of the State College and Department of Agriculture, urges North Carolina farmers to think more about their home grown seed. Last year he found good seed oats that had been brought from New York and other distant states, while the results of tests made over many years show that home grown seed from selected plants have always yielded higher returns than these imported seeds.

For instance, Dr. Winters says in a case of oats grown by the Edgewood Seed Breeders' Association, which yielded 43 bushels to the acre, was sown with a yield of 30 bushels to the acre secured from commercial seed. The Edgewood growers, of course, select their own seed and have seen their oats.

At Statesville, on the farm of W. Watts, tests made in cooperation with Dr. Winters, showed that commercial seed yielded about 20 bushels per acre while plants selected from the best of the commercial seed yielded 67 bushels per acre.

On the Piedmont Branch Station Farm near Statesville, W. Watts completed a test this year in which he secured a yield of 45.6 bushels per acre from his own selected seed of Appley oats grown on the farm, as compared with only 28.2 bushels per acre from seed secured from a commercial source. Dr. Winters states that such differences in yield as these are well worth considering and recommends that North Carolina growers pay more attention to their oat seed this fall, using home grown seed if possible.
