PURCHASER LOCAL FURNITURE CO. IS DIRECTOR N.Y. BANK

Is only 33 Years Old, Yet has Accumulated Fortune—Has High Ideals of Ethics

It became known here a few days ago that Irving Isaacs, a New York furniture dealer and a purchaser of furniture built by the Valley River Furniture Company, of this city, has recently been made a director of the Fifth National Bank of New York City and in connection with the announcement the story of his phenomenal achievements was also revealed. It is reported that he is also a director of the Hospital for Joint Diseases in New York, and is a stockholder of record in more than 100 corporations.

His appointment makes him one of the youngest, if not actually the youngest, director in any national bank of New York City, and back of the appointment lies a story said to contain an unusual code of business ethics. This code, according to the statement of Linus P. Hosmer, cashier of the bank, first struck the admiration of the bank's officers and finally resulted in tendering to Mr. Isaacs a position on the Board of Directors as a reward.

The story dates back to 1919 when, it was explained, the bank lent Mr. Isaacs \$50,000. A short time later the bank learned he had used the money for stock market purposes, and the bank's Directors called him in for an explanation. Mr. Isaacs admitted that he had used the money in connection with a brokerage transaction, explaining that he had bought a stock priced at \$202 a share instead of a railroad stock (Texas & Pacific) priced then at \$50 a share. This purchase, he explained, was an error on the part of the brokerage house which, he said, had volunteered to stand good for a loss of 20 points per share on the higher priced stock which had suffered a violent decline.

On second thought, the investor explained, he took into consideration that he would have taken a profit on the same transaction had the stock bought in error moved up 20 points, and on the strength of that fact he had decided to relieve the brokerage firm from any loss and to take the full loss himself. It was for this purpose that he had borrowed the \$50,000. The directors investigated his story and substantiated it. As a consequence they made no demand for payment of the loan.

Two years ago, according to the bank's record, a friend of Mr. Isaacs was caught in a panic which upset the silk business. The friend owed the Fifth National Bank \$150,000, and Mr. Isaacs knew he had no money with which to pay it. Without hesitation, Mr. Isaacs went to the bank, paid the obligation off in full, and, since he had neither guaranteed these notes nor recommended his friend, thus gave to the bank's officers a surprise which one officer described as a "pleasant shock." Subsequently the silk man came back and fully repaid Mr. Isaacs for his venture, which at the time was purely a gamble based on friendship.

These two incidents, Mr. Hosmer said, drew the attention of the bank to Mr. Isaacs, and thereafter the bank's officers were awaiting a chance to tender a reward, which came finally in the form of the appointment of a directorship.

Officers are searching for Will McDonald, charged with complicity in the robbery, and fifteen pairs of shoes stolen from the store, and found along the road have been recovered.
