At the regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of Cherokee County, N. C., on the 3rd day of March, 1924, a petition was presented to the said board, signed by more than one-third of the qualified voters of a certain boundary in School District No. 7, Murphy Township, Cherokee County, N. C., hereinafter described and set out, asking that an election be called by the said board for the purpose of voting for or against a Special School Tax, of not more than thirty (30) cents on the hundred dollars worth of property and 90 cents on each taxable poll in said boundary, to supplement the public school fund which may be apportioned to said district by the County Board of Education.

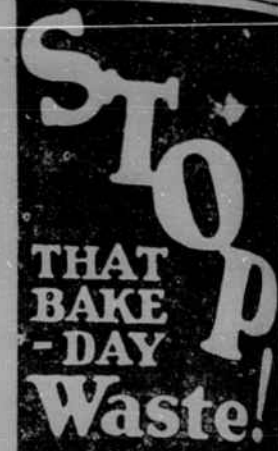
