## Eat More Eggs, Says Dr. Kaupp

Raleigh, N. C.—From field workers of the extension division came reporting that there is an alarming surplus of eggs now being produced by the farm flocks of North Carolina. Unless these eggs are disposed of to advantage by the farmers, the extension workers feel that the growing of poultry as an important part of the safe farming program advocated by College and department workers will receive a setback; therefore, it is suggested that now while eggs are cheap and plentiful, they be preserved in water glass or in lime water for use later in the winter when eggs are scarce and high in price.
