Regal Blue Marble Co. Stockholders Have Meeting

The principal stockholders of the Regal Blue Marble Company met at the office of the plant about two miles from here last week and reviewed the progress the company is making. Aside from the meeting, business considerations to come up a number of questions and proposals were discussed. A tough decision was reached on the matter considered yet it has been definitely decided to open another quarry and begin the quarrying of white marble. The famous "Regal Blue" will also be quarried in ever-increasing quantities.

"With the production of the two colors," stated officials of the company, "the sales possibilities are greatly increased, as it is much easier to sell a mixed car than to sell a car of one color. And on account of freight rates, it is necessary to mix ways with the marble in carload lots."

The attention contemplated will include the installation of additional machinery and the use of additional power.

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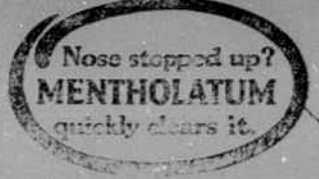
