### Clay County Agent Carrying On Corn Production Tests

Hayesville, June 24.—In an attempt to find a scientific answer to the oft heard question of "What is the best variety of corn for Clay County?" County Agent W. R. Anderson is conducting four corn production tests in the county with a number of varieties of corn to see which will make the best production. These tests are being carried on under the plan known as the community corn test plots. County Agent Anderson explained that by this was

meant that the best varieties from the community were put against one another and against the best varieties from all over the state that is adaptable to this section. In this way, it is hoped that the one or two varieties that will yield best on Clay County soil might be discovered. In these tests plots usually ten varieties of corn have been used, with two rows of each variety.

All who are interested in knowing how to increase production of corn without increasing the fertility of the land or doing additional tillage should study these tests, said Mr. Anderson. Production in corn yields have been increased one-fifth by the use of different varieties of corn without increasing fertility, it was explained.

These community plots are located at John Tiger's, on Shooting Creek; at Witt Penland's, at Elf; Lee Penland's, at Hayesville; and in Mr. Abe Green's crop at L. L. Scrogg's at Brasstown.
