**S. S. Lesson For July 27th, 1924**

Sunday School Lesson for July 27, 1924.  
The Temptation of Jesus.

Theme: Victory over the tempter.  
Golden Text: For in that he himself hath suffered being tempted, he is able also to succor them that are tempted, Heb. 2:18.

In dealing with the temptation of our Lord I know of no better treatment than the furnished in Dr. Morgan's book "The Crisis of the Christ." I shall endeavor therefore only to give the summary of the three temptations in the wilderness. The first one it is possible to do in his own words. In the second and third it is necessary to try to give a brief of what Dr. Morgan has said, a thing that is exceedingly difficult to do from a short article any extra words.

The first temptation followed the heels of thirty days fast. When Jesus was so hungered the Tempter said to him "If thou be the Son of God command that these stones be made bread." Our author said "The temptation was the temptation of the Son of God to the will of the flesh. The approach was the perfectly natural and sinless hunger of his manhood. The argument used was that if he were the Son of God, He might use that privilege to minister to his necessity, without consulting the will of his Father."

There was a temptation to temptation which was the spirit of the temptation of the flesh. The devil did not suggest that he should minister to a craving of His that was not in itself right. The enemy asked Him to satisfy a lawful appetite in an illegal fashion. The temptation was an attempt to pervert the will. This was done by a subtle suggestion of the omnipotence of God, in order to pervert love towards God. This suggestion was of the nature of an attempt to cloud the intelligence, by mixing the privileges and responsibilities of Sonship.

In answer Jesus defines his own position. He recognizes that it is as man that he is being tempted and as a man he meets the temptation. The sword is used when he says "It is written". He did not meet the devil as God but as man and therefore he said "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God."

As man he is in complete submission to the will of God. Satan's temptation was that he would let me, I choose to hunger in that will, rather than to find any satisfaction outside it. (A thought paraphrasing of the actual words of Jesus) Satan tried to lure Jesus into a position outside the will of God and he failed.

In the second temptation Satan tried to wreck the perfect and abiding confidence of Jesus in God. If Jesus for one moment even in his hunger had ceased to have delight in the will of God for Him Satan would have been victorious. Satan takes Him into the Holy city and says "If thou be the Son of God cast thyself down for it is written, He shall give his angels charge concerning thee: and in their hands they shall bear thee up, lest at any time thou dash thy foot against a stone. He is trying to force Jesus to demonstrate his trust in the Father. He uses Scripture in tempting Him. A trusting soul never desires to tempt or test a trifle. It calmly quietly abides in sure confidence. Trust is not evidenced by doing the extraordinary. We do not need to do anything magnificent to demonstrate confidence. There are men who clamor for a demonstration of trust in God. But trust never calls for such action.

Jesus answered by saying in effect you must use that which is written properly. Again, "It is written, Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God. Again the foe is vanquished." Jesus by refusing to tempt God, demonstrated his perfect confidence in him, and thus revealed for all time the fact that man, so devoid of selfish interest as to be willing not to appear heroic, in confidence, may dare all hell, and issue from the conflict more than conqueror.

In the third temptation Satan realizes that he cannot ruin the man but he dares to try to ruin his work. If he could have gotten Jesus to have worshipped him he would have had no trouble to have enlisted his service. The kingdom was to be Christ by the way of the Cross. Satan offers it in a divided state simply for worship. Jesus uses his own authority in answering. He commands "get thee hence, Satan." Then he flushes the word again for it is written thou shalt worship the Lord thy God and him only shalt thou serve.
