When men and women go astray about us, we should not be content to allow them to go on on the downward trail, but go out ourselves and seek to recover and restore those who go wrong." The speaker emphasized the fact that we should believe in them, encourage and cheer them—"considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted."

In the next admission, "Cast thy burden upon the Lord, and He shall sustain thee," the speaker asked: "Who is there that has not felt the crying with the Psalmist: 'Oh, that I had wings like a dove, for then I would fly away and be at rest.' Wednesday night the theme of the sermon was "Dangers of Rinsing God," the text being taken from Job: "Who hath hardened him against God, and hath prospered?"

The speaker urged his hearers, that if they forgot all that he said, not to forget the text: "Who hath hardened himself against God, and hath prospered?"

How do you find a man hardened against God? The speaker repeatedly, and the reasons, he said, were many and various. One he said, was in relating to come out for God when the holy Spirit was striving within. Delay makes it more difficult, more formidable, and was one of the most perilous obstacles with which to deal. Delay is dangerous and he urged teachers, preachers and Christians to deal gently and earnestly with young people in the effort to get them to make the decision in the springtime of life, which is God's appointed time. Another reason was through and by the power of public opinion; that "the fear of men bringeth a snare."

"Oh the power and influence of public opinion." One waits for another; one acts because of another; one is silent because of another; the man who does not care about his influence over somebody else must be a fool, or a monster, or both.
