

**MEETING CLOSES WITH POWERFUL APPEAL**

toward building a great commonwealth. He said that North Carolina is doing some things in the way of road building, the erection of school houses, and other things. He declared that North Carolina was making more progress materially than any other Southern state, and perhaps more than any other state in the Union. "All this sets songs of joy loose in my heart," said the noted minister. "I rejoice with you people of my native land." Dr. Truett said he was more pleased to find spiritual progress being made in this state. It is this kind of progress, he said, that he is most concerned with. In his introductory remarks, Dr. Truett took occasion to comment on the Baptist five-year campaign for \$5,000,000.00 being waged for the mission work of the church. "The \$5 million campaign has made history for us, the thrill of which has gone to the ends of the earth," the noted divine declared. "It has provoked songs of joy clear around the world." Dr. Truett also gave some interesting figures concerning the work of the Baptist Church. He said that the church has baptized over a million people in the United States during the past five years. He declared the growth of the church to be great in other lands. "We are able to account for more than 12,000,000 Baptists around the world," he stated. "In these days," said Dr. Truett, "every man is called upon to be a world citizen. We are at the most auspicious and challenging days the world ever saw. Every man must think and act and plan in world terms. What we do in Murphy, Dallas, Penchtree or Brasstown will affect the whole world." The preacher declared that it is necessary that the great campaigns continue. "But how," he asked, "are we going to carry these great campaigns through? There is only one way. That is by dedicating our lives to Christ. We will never win these great victories for Christ unless we dedicate our lives to Him. The so-

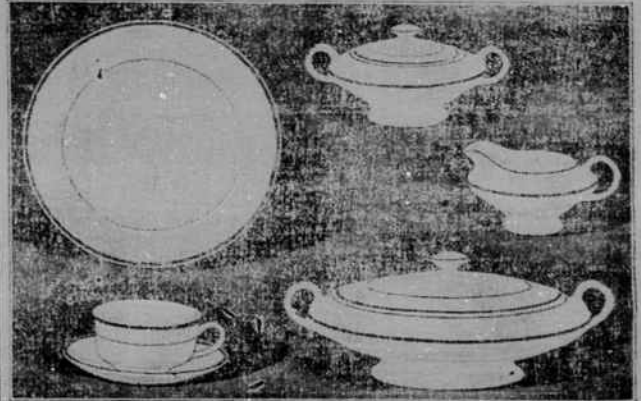
