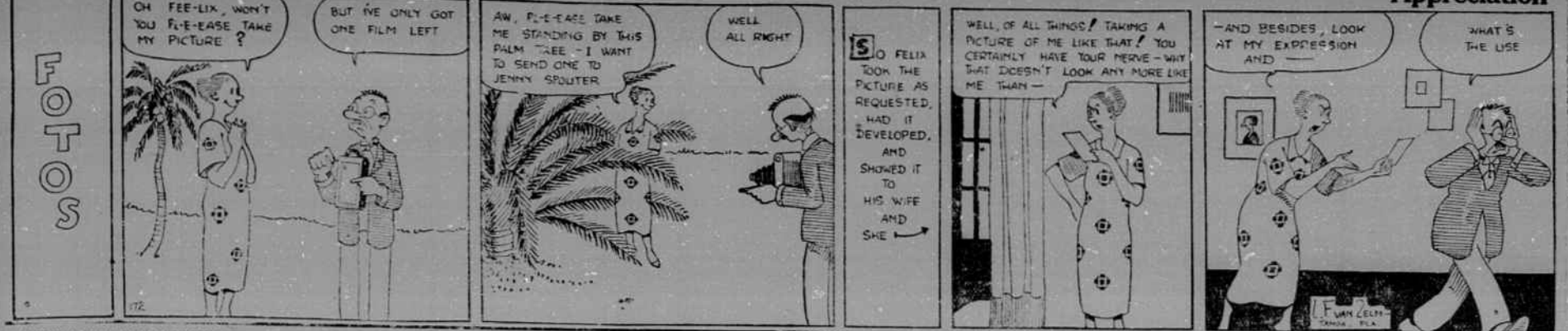

Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Bronwell spent two days of this week in Atlanta.

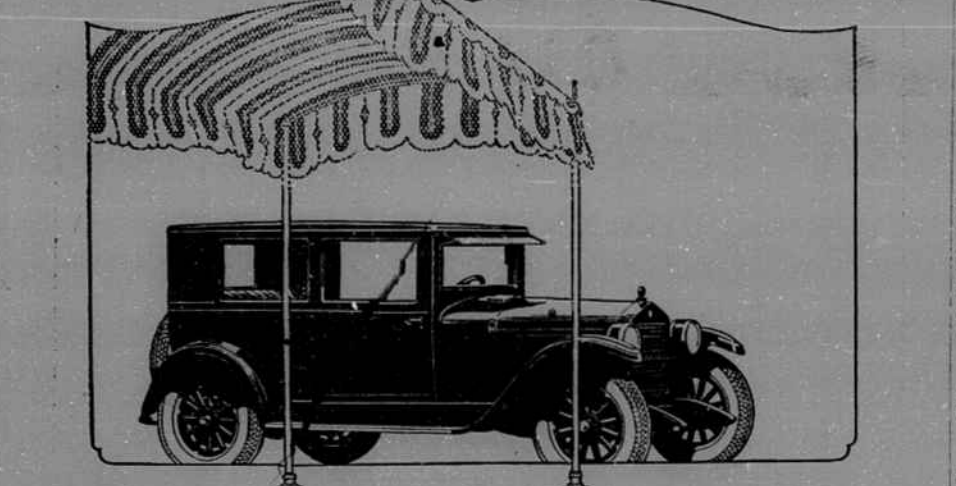
