KNOW NORTH CAROLINA

According to the federal Department of Commerce North Carolina had an estimated true wealth in 1922 of \$4,543,110,000, and was the third richest state in the South. Texas, with five times our area has twice our wealth, while Virginia ranks slightly ahead of us in estimated true wealth. However, in the annual production of wealth, which is perhaps far more important, North Carolina ranks second only to Texas in all the South. The output of our mines, forests, farms and industries for the year 1923 was around one billion six hundred million dollars, which was considerably more wealth than any other state in the South produced, Texas alone excepted. Both on the farm and in the factory North Carolina holds high rank among the states of the Union in the value of wealth created annually.—News Letter.
