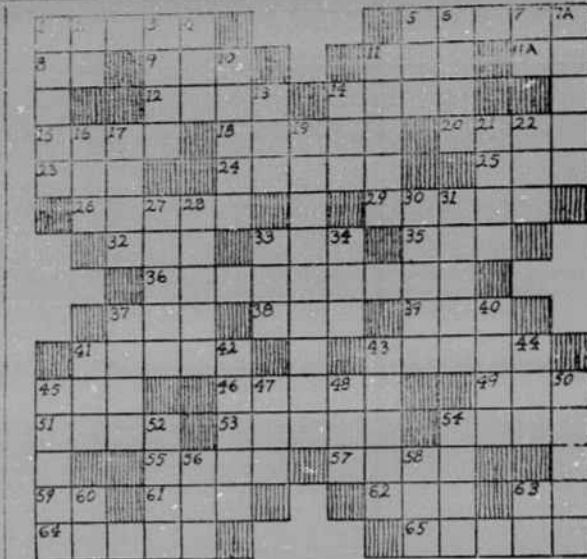

THE FOREST PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION ITS VALUE CHEROKEE AND CLAY

realizing the importance of the wood crop to her own welfare, agrees to meet one-half the cost of this protection, provided a large enough area is combined to make an economical administration of the area. Patrolmen and lookouts are given state warden authority, and the state forest laws are enforced through the organization.

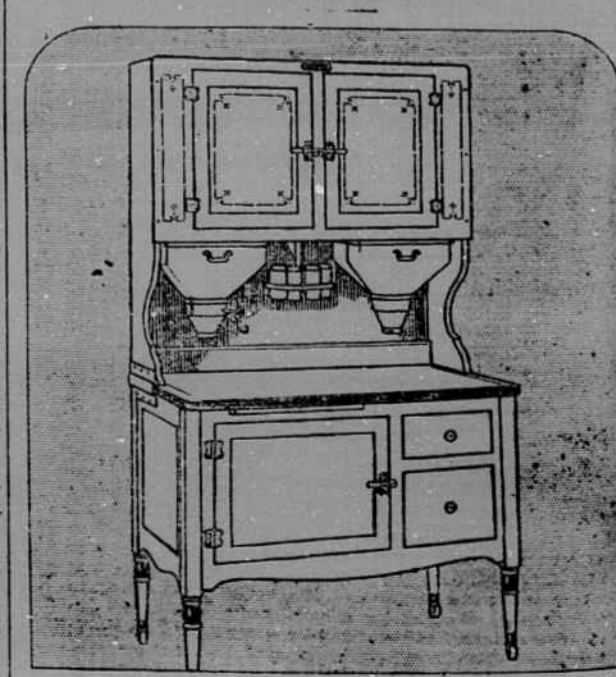
The forest landowners, appreciating that they have made their living from the forests, just as the farmer make his living from the fields, is willing to meet a part of the expense necessary to assure the logging of the forest in condition to produce a good crop of timber. While the Association is being started by the State and larger landowners, the small owners of property within the Association area are invited and urged to join, and to add the weight of their approval to the work of assuring a perpetual supply of wood in Cherokee and Clay counties.

Since the two county governments do not feel able to assist in the forest protection work, the individual landowners are shouldering the weight and hope to be able to give sufficient protection to perpetuate the wood supply. For though they will not harvest the next growth of trees themselves they realize the necessity of wood, and intend to see that their youth will have fuel and lumber when he reaches manhood.
