Notice is hereby given that under and by virtue of Chapter 136, Article 17, Section 204 et seq., and under and by virtue of a resolution of this Board duly adopted on this date, an election is hereby called to be held at the Upper Tazewell School House, in Tazewell Township, Clay County, on the 27th day of April, 1926, to ascertain the will of the people in a certain District in said Township bounded as follows:

BEGINNING at the mouth of Shearer Millcreek; thence up said creek to the Gold mine ridge to the top of the Tazewell Bald; thence from the said Bald to the Mason County line; thence with the Mason County line to the mouth of Buck Creek; thence up the Buzzard Sapling ridge to the divide between Tazewell and Nantahala; thence with the divide between the Shooting Creek Bald, thence with the divide between Shooting Creek and Tazewell to the top of Pinay Mountain; thence down said divide between Looking, Samsy Creek and Cole's Branch to the beginning, known as Upper Tazewell District.

Said Election is called for the purpose of ascertaining whether there shall be levied in said District a special annual tax of twenty-five (25) cents on the one hundred dollar valuation of real and personal property, to supplement the Public School Fund which may be apportioned to said District and said Township by the County Board of Education of Clay County.

Bids will be received by T. W. Axley, Chairman County Board of Commissioners of Cherokee County, Murphy, North Carolina, until Thursday, April 15th, 1926 at 12 o'clock noon for the erection of a court house for the said county, to be two stories in height, to contain offices for all necessary county officials, court room, etc. To be built of brick, marble, stone, hollow tile, the floors, ceiling and roof, stairs, etc. to be of reinforced concrete, dome and lantern to be of steel construction. Building will be heated from the present jail building by low pressure steam heat. The construction of said building is to begin within thirty days after awarding the contract and to be completed by December 1st, 1926.

Payments for work and material to be made from time to time on estimates furnished from the contractor and approved by the architect, averaging 85 per cent of the work done and material on the ground. Balance of 15 per cent to be paid when the building is fully complete and accepted by the architect and Board of County Commissioners.

Each bidder to deposit with his bid a certified check for \$1,000.00 payable to T. W. Axley, Chairman of County Commissioners or his successors, as a guarantee that he will enter into a contract with the County upon the term of his bid within ten days after the acceptance of his bid and give a bond in some surety company for faithful performance of his contract, bond to be in the sum of the full amount of the contract price and that upon his failure to enter such a contract and give bond said check is to be retained by Cherokee County as liquidated damages.
