**Important Notice To All Ex-Service Men Of The World War**

Resolved: Adopted by the Executive Committee of the Association of Life Insurable Presidents on March 5th.

"Whereas the time within which War Risk Yearly Renewable Term insurance may be reinstated and converted expires July 2, 1926, and forms are being made to urge some men of the World War to reinstate insurance and convert to some permanent plan, the Executive Committee of the Association of Life Insurance Presidents reaffirms a resolution adopted at the twelfth annual convention of the Association on December 8th, 1918, as follows:

"Resolved, That the Association of Life Insurance Presidents, in an emergency assembled, hereby expresses its opinion that it is in the advantage of every soldier and sailor to continue to keep in force such insurance as he may have effected with the Federal War Risk Insurance Act and hereby requests all life insurance companies to impress upon all members of their home office and agents organizations to do everything in their power to urge such soldiers and sailors to continue their government life insurance and to recommend to them that they convert such temporary government insurance at the earliest possible opportunity into one of the permanent plans provided for by the War Risk Insurance Act."

Veterans of the World War who have allowed their War Risk insurance to lapse, or who have not, are continuing same upon the original term plan should communicate without delay with the U. S. Veterans' Bureau, Third Floor, Johnston Building, Charlotte, N. C., for particulars as to reinstatement and conversion, or blanks and information may be obtained at the County Welfare Department—Office in County Murphy, N. C.

Six standard forms of old line life reserve (converted) policies are offered by the Government as follows: Ordinary life, 20-payment life, 20-payment life, 20-year endowment, 20-year endowment and endowment maturing at age sixty-two, upon the lowest possible net cost basis; rate subject to annual dividend, and as much lower than those offered by commercial companies.
