City Purchases New Fire Engine

The city fathers recently purchased a new fire engine for the city fire department at a cost of \$6500. The old engine was traded in on the new one for a consideration of one thousand dollars.

The new engine was built by the American La France Fire Engine Company, of Elmira, N. Y., and is of the latest type. It has a capacity of 400 gallons of water per minute, and will take water right from the river as easily as from the city mains. It carries 1200 feet of two and one-half inch hose, and 20 feet of three-quarter inch hose for the chemical tank, and a number of ladders. The force with which it throws will put water over the top of any building in Murphy, it was stated by Sid Pendley, who is chief of the local fire department.

It has been felt that a new engine was needed for the city, and this gives the city one of the most modern officials stated.
