BE IT UNANIMOUSLY ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF MURPHY, N. C.

1. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep, maintain or operate any livery stable, sales or feed stable, or any barn or stable in which more than two head of draft or live stock are habitually kept, near than two

hundred feet to any of the principal streets of the Town of Murphy, viz: Tennessee Street, Hiawasse Street, Peachtree Street and Valley River Avenue.

2. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provision of this ordinance shall pay a penalty of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) and each day of such violation shall be deemed a separate offense.

3. That this ordinance shall go into effect thirty days after ratification, this the twenty third day of September, One thousand nine hundred and twenty six.

Cohen is one of the original road enthusiasts in the South and one of the greatest boosters the Appalachian Scenic Highway the State of Georgia.

The new concrete highway just South of Gainesville Georgia the Appalachian Scenic Highway been completed and was opened through traffic this week, according information received from Henry Estes, president of the Georgia vision at Gainesville. This eleven miles continuous stretch of highway eliminates the last troublesome detour between Asheville and Atlanta, 264 miles of hard surf road via Bryson City, Murphy, Blaine, Gainesville, Buford, Lawrenville, Decatur and Atlanta. Cars averaging 33 miles an hour over route. The autocade being organized to make this trip October 18th, limit their speed to 30 miles in order to keep the 100 or more cars packed, in their numerical order line.
