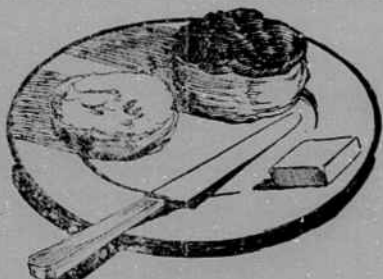

## Arama Grotto To Be Organized for Murphy

Monarch I. M. Deaver and Propher J. C. Johnson, of the Knoxville, Tenn., Arama Grotto, were in town this week making arrangements for the organization of a like class in Murphy. The class here will be known as the J. W. Davidson and J. B. Story Class, by whom it is being sponsored and who are responsible for the organization coming to Murphy for the day.

Arrangements were made for the Arama Grotto of Knoxville to visit Murphy on October 29th. They will bring with them their band that recently layed in contest in St. Louis, Mo., with many bands throughout the United States, and won first prize. This band will give free to the public a concert on the public square of Murphy, N. C., lasting for more than two hours. Also accompanying this organization is the famous ukelele string quartet. The Grotto is a play ground for Master Masons and was organized in 1800 in Hamilton, N. Y. All officers of this organization will accompany the band in full uniform, on special train, including patrol, and other bodies.

They will arrive about noon, and a parade will be staged, including the local men who are candidates. A traffic Cop down will be a feature, an expert directing traffic in his own manner, and the day promises to be a red letter one for Murphy.
