following tribute to her father, Jac-
ob Farney Abernathy, whose soul
marching on.
His passing occurred in community
in which he was born and reared and
in which he moved with force and
influence.

He deserves more than ordinary
active, being the type of man not
common in the south a generation

ago.
Of distinguished ancestry, being
a descendant of General Morgan of
Revolutionary fame for whom the
town of Morganton, N. C., was named
and a kinsman of John Abernathy
the famous Scotch surgeon, discoverer
of the anesthetic.

He was educated at the old Hay-
esville Academy and the Louisville
Medical College.

While yet a lad he fared forth and
rode the plains of the West as a dat-
-e herder. Well remembered are the
stories he related of life in the don
ramps when the evening lamp was
lit.

Like a soldier at the front, he
died in his armor. The torch that
he bore can not be quenched but
will appear again, a brighter flame.

A delighted companion, widely in-
formed, a lover of nature, a man of
literary taste and talent. No one
who ever knew Jacob Farney Abernathy
will forget him.
