CHRISTMAS PLAY BAPTIST CHURCH

The Christmas program of the Baptist church will be given Monday evening, December 23, at 7 o'clock.

The program will be a Christmas play entitled: "When Santa Forgot the Smiths." Before the play there will be a prologue, "The Story of Bethlehem," when the "Voice of the Centuries" calls on the angels to tell again the story of Bethlehem and contrasts the humility and adoration of the first Christmas with the spirit of Christmas today. Complete redesigning of the instrument board with a convenient grouping of the instruments in a decorative panel is another nicety apparent in the Whippet models with the employment of indirect lighting.

To permit easy entrance and exit the doors of the various models have been widened with a continuance of the use of remote door controls.

Although the power plants in both the Whippet four and Whippet six have shown outstanding speed, power and stamina in the past and have been accepted as the ideal engine in their respective price classes, certain improvements are noted in the power plants now employed to give a much higher speed and power rating although the fundamental principles of design and construction remain unchanged.
