OFFICERS GET TWO STILLS AND **QUANTITY BEER**

Past Few Days Proves Costly To Manufacturers of Contraband Spirits In Cherokee

The past few days have been rathcostly to the manufacturers of whiskey in the county. Officers captured two stills and poured out several hundred gallons of beer and some whiskey. A third distilling place was found with enough mash for 300 gallons of beer, but on this occasion the still was missing and a diligent search failed to disclose its hiding place. All three of the stills were found in the Grape Creek

On Friday night of last week, Deputies O. C. Davis, Sam Capps and Bob Graves located a 20 gallon outfit near the mouth of Grape Creek, confiscated the still and de-stroyed about 500 gallons of beer. The furnace for this outfit had just been erected, the officers stated, and a small fire built in it to dry it out. Evidences showed that it was just getting ready for operation when they found it. No one was at the place and no arrests were made.

In Beaverdam Township Sunday, Deputies Sam Capps and Bob Graves came apon the site of a still in be-low Ogreeta on what is known as the noon from Marble. Whiteomb property. They destroyed enough mash to make 300 gallons of beer, they stated, but the still was missing. The furnace was there, and they searched the vicinity for the still but to no avail.

Monday night Deputies Davis, Capps and Graves surprised two men operating a still in full blast about half mile east of the Ogreeta school house.

The officers approached to within about ten feet of the still before they were discovered. Some possum hunters were on the ridge above and the operators were very tious. One of them discovered that some one was approaching close. and held a big torch above his head. When the officers were discovered. he threw the torch to the ground, velled, and took to the bushes, followed by his partner. The officers gave chase, but in the darkness and not being familiar with the lay of the land, the blockaders succeeded in making good their escape, but not however until they had been recognized.

The outfit was in operation in full blast. The still was full of "singlings," and real corn liquor was running from the "worm" into a gallon demijohn container. Only about a quart had been "run." The officers confiscated the outfit and destroyed about 300 gallons of beer.
