NEW BUS LINE BETWEEN MURPHY AND ATLANTA

A new bus line has just started operation between Murphy and Atlanta, Ga., by way of Copperhill, Tenn., Blue Ridge, Canton, and Marietta, Ga., which is owned by the Carolina-Tennessee-Georgia Bus Co., Incorporated.

The busses are so scheduled that two leave Atlanta daily for Murphy, and two leave Murphy daily for Atlanta.

The corporation owning and operating the busses, is a Murphy concern, and was incorporated in North Carolina. The incorporators are T. S. Evans, President; R. L. Lance, Vice President; and C. W. Savage, Secretary and Treasurer and general manager. The company was incorporated at a capital stock of \$25,000.00, with \$6,000.00 paid in. The main office of the company is Murphy, N. C.

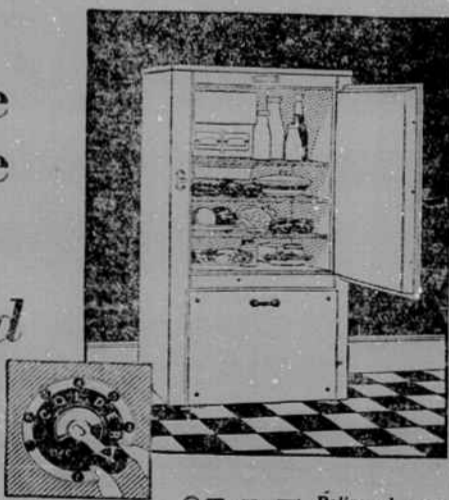

Evansville, Ind., one of the important terminal points on the L. & N. System, has a population of over 100,000, probably the third largest city in the State. From a manufacturing and business standpoint, it is easily second in volume and value of its products.
Located at Evansville are 236 industries, producing a great variety of manufactured and processed articles, whose value in 1927 amounted to \$38,129,000.
