

# MRS. WARREN THANKS PEOPLE

I take this means of thanking the people of Murphy, Andrews, and the county generally for all the kindnesses you have shown me since I have been your Superintendent of Public Welfare. I feel I have made many friends during my stay among you and these friendships shall never be forgotten.

I desire especially to thank you for your vote of confidence in me in my efforts to handle the many problems of the Department of Public Welfare. You not only expressed confidence in me personally but in the office of public welfare by appearing twice before the Board of County Commissioners with earnest pleas for a continuance of this office. Both the men and the women who fought heroically in what was destined to be a losing cause and I thank you all with my whole heart. I am thoroughly convinced that those of you who appeared before the county commissioners in the interest of the welfare work not only expressed your own sentiments in regard to the work but you voiced the feelings of a big majority of the people of Cherokee county. And there are none who know this any better than the commissioners themselves.

The Fates, however, were against us. If every man, woman and child in the county had appeared before our present commissioners, the results would have been the same. The commissioners did not want this question put to a vote of the people—they did not want a petition from the people—already they knew what the verdict would be and they had already made up their minds what they were going to do. The sentiment of the people was stubbornly resisted and ignored. It was a case where the chosen representatives of the people deliberately refused to represent them or even lend them a respectful and attentive ear. It was a case where the leaders of righteousness and progress were compelled to fight for life against a selfish, governing Board which had political debts to pay and they meant to pay them regardless of the wishes of the people, or of an office which deserved to be continued, and in respect of law and constitutional government. The spokesmen of progress and enlightenment have little chance for victory in a fight against a selfish, moral and petty county political body entrusted with a governmental power. Our county commissioners had already predetermined their course. They soft peddled and suppressed all facts that might throw a doubt upon their course of action and as deliberately turned a deaf ear to the pleas and petitions of the leaders throughout the county.

To me the sentiment expressed by the people toward the recent action of the commissioners in connection with the welfare office is most gratifying. I believe that it means a reinstatement of the welfare work when the present Board of Commissioners go out of office.

I appreciate the encouragement and support of every individual to whom has given it or tendered it. I desire particularly to thank my County Welfare Board and my Murphy and Andrews Boards for their hearty cooperation and support. Their kindly counsel and advice has been of great assistance to me in the solution of many problems affecting the happiness and the welfare of the people. I thank the churches of Murphy and of Andrews for the spiritual cooperation they have shown. I thank the lawyers and doctors for their free advice and assistance. I thank my Girl Scouts for their activities in behalf of our needy and crippled humanity. They have always responded to my call. Indeed, it has been a pleasure to work with them and to have had the honor of being the first to enroll them in the Girl Scout movement. I thank the school teachers of the county for their aid in my efforts to enforce the compulsory school attendance law. I do not know how they will fare the coming year. Our commissioners have dealt a severe blow to our school system. It is a physical impossibility for Mr. Martin to handle the welfare work along with his many other duties and responsibilities. Dr. Morrow cannot handle it because his duties are carved out for him by law and this law makes it a misdemeanor for him to do anything else. He is legally bound to devote his full time to his duties as health officer. Dr. Morrow is not likely to do something he is not obligated to do.

I thank the poor and unfortunate people in the county—those whom I have helped and those who need it—for their expressions of gratitude for the services. I have rendered them and of regret that I am leaving. If during my stay here I had done nothing more than rescue one wayward girl from immoral ruin and drag one delinquent boy back from the frowning gates of the penitentiary, my labors were not in vain. For who will place a price upon an upright, self-supporting human life that has been salvaged from the wreckage of humanity to the good of the world? I thank the mayor of Murphy and the ex-mayor of Andrews for their friendly assistance in the cases I brought before them. I thank the colored people of the county for the interest they manifested in my work. I thank the merchant and business men of Murphy for the help they gave in making the Christmas tree possible last Christmas. That event gladdened the heart of many a little fellow, who otherwise, might have missed the thrill of the Christmas spirit. I extend my congratulations to the ex-commissioners of Cherokee county for their humanity and vision in putting on the welfare work, and I thank them heartily for their continued support of it. I thank the Board of Education for their loyalty to me in the common cause for which we fought. And I thank the editor of The Scout for his past favors and his kindness in giving me space for this.

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May I assure the people of the county that my stay here has been both pleasant and profitable. I do not say in any material sense, but I have found value and happiness in the friendships I have formed and in the work I have done. Perhaps I cannot claim all my acquaintances as my friends. Maybe I should say they are nearly all my friends. Our present county commissioners have not gazed upon the results of my labors but I am able to see them. I can come back here at the end of a decade and still see them. I repeat, my stay here has been both pleasant and profitable. I have come to love the people of Cherokee county and to enjoy the summertime in the mountains—the inspiring, lofty, mountains whose wonderful and spiraling peaks point upward toward a just and eternal God.

## BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF MURPHY:

- 1. That it shall be unlawful for any dog to run at large within the corporate limits of the town of Murphy between July 15th, 1929, and November 1, 1929; and any owner or keeper of a dog who shall allow or permit the same to run at large within the corporate limits of the Town of Murphy between said dates shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, shall be fined \$10.00 for each offense.
- 2. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from July 15th, 1929, to November 1, 1929.
