WHEREAS, levd women, in increasing numbers, are to be found upon the public streets, and loitering at places of business and other public places within the Town of Murphy, many, or all, of whom being afflicted with venereal diseases; and WHEREAS, the prevalence of levdness within the Town of Murph, and vicinity has been, and is, the means of spreading venereal diseases, among the youth and other inhabitants of the town, from which diseases a number of the youth and other inhabitants of the town are now suffering; said lewdness thereby constituting a menace to the public health and morals of the Town of Murphy. THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF MURPHY:

1.
