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ASSOCIATED CHARITIES ORGANIZED

Town To Be Canvassed In Next Few Weeks To Raise Funds To Care For Needy

On Thursday evening, Oct. 29th, selected members from each religious, civic and patriotic organization in our City met at the Carnegie Library and effected the Organization known as the Associated Charities. The movement has been on foot for sometime, a meeting having been held about three weeks ago by interested parties, at which time a committee was appointed to draft by-laws and work out final details.

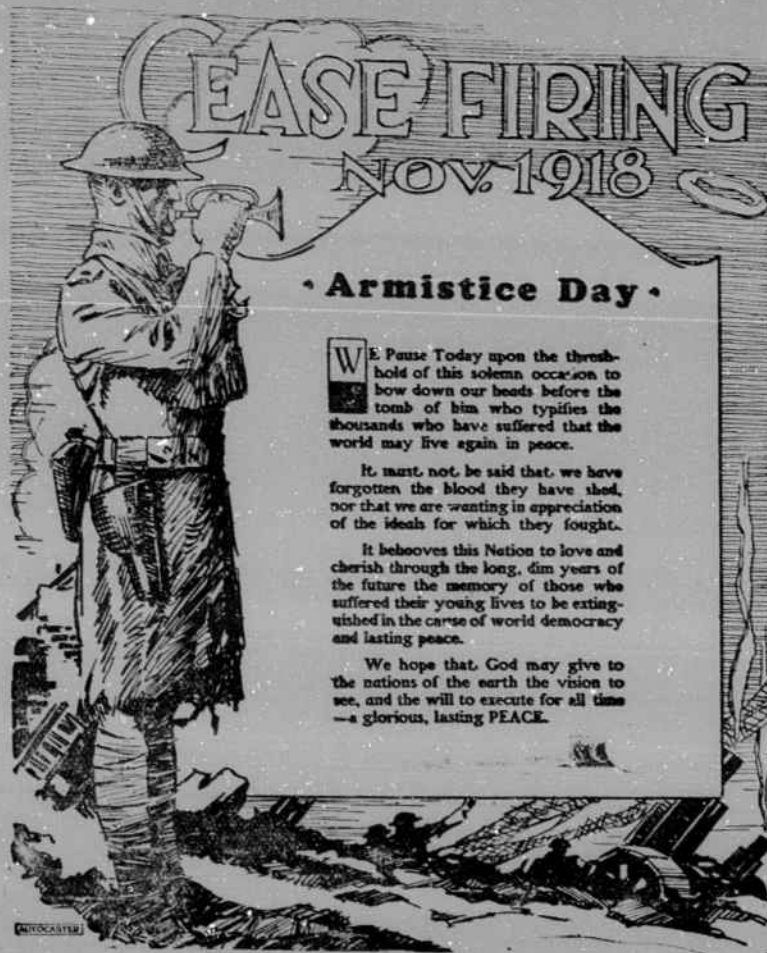
These by-laws, covering the purpose and scope of the organization, were then read before each organization of our city and approved. Following this, each organization appointed a member from their body to serve on the advisory board of the Associated Charities. These members then met and chose Mrs. H. G. Elkins, representing the Murphy Women's Club, as Chairman, and Dr. Edw. E. Adams, representing the Murphy Lions Club, as Secretary-treasurer. The other members of the advisory board with their organizations, are as follows: Mrs. G. W. Ellis, representing the Methodist Women's Missionary Society, Mrs. E. E. Adams, representing the Baptist Women's Missionary Union, Miss Polly Davis, representing the Murphy Junior Women's Club, Mrs. C. W. Savage, representing the Presbyterian Women's Auxiliary, and Mr. W. E. Studstill, representing the Joe Miller Elkins Post of the American Legion.

The object of this body of workers is to secure as many individuals from their organization as possible, and from the outside, as members of the Associated Charities. Members of the latter organization will be asked to give twenty-five cents a month the year round, in money, food or clothing. It is believed that with all representatives organizations working together in this way, between 75 and 100 members will be secured who can and will give this much, and there will be other who can and will give more than this. Later the County and Town authorities will be called upon for a subscription, as will residents not connected with either of the above organizations. It is a COMMUNITY affair, and it is felt that each resident who can should and will be glad to help.

These funds, the food and clothing will be collected by the member on the advisory board representing the different organizations, from the members willing to join the Associated Charities from his or her organization. Among those not connected with either organization other committees will work. All funds, food and clothing will be turned over to Mr. R. W. Gray, County Agricultural Agent, who has done such notably fine work as chairman for the Red Cross, and he will have sole charge of the distribution of same. Mr. Gray has been kind enough to consent to handle this end of the work in connection with his Red Cross work, and no one is more able to do it efficiently and sympathetically. He will keep a record of all funds, food and clothing dispensed, and to whom, and this record will be published regularly, along with a list of the members of the Associated Charities.

The drive for membership in the Associated Charities is now on, beginning November 1st, and during the next few days there will be few who are not approached. Please be considering the proposition, and make up your mind whether you can give twenty-five cents a month in money, food or clothing the year round so

WOMAN'S CLUB HEARS OF RED CROSS WORK

County Chairman Tells of Drouth Relief and Other Work In The County

The regular monthly meeting of the Murphey Woman's Club was held in the club rooms Wednesday afternoon, October 30, with the president, Mrs. T. S. Evans, presiding.

A special feature of the afternoon was the talk made by Mr. R. W. Gray, County Agent and chairman of the county chapter of the American Red Cross, who spoke of the splendid work done by the Red Cross in times of need, and he told of the number of families helped by this organization in our county during the past year. Clothing and food has been distributed amongst the needy and garden seed and cans were given to families who, otherwise, would not have been able to plant a garden or can fruits and vegetables for winter use; also a large quantity of yeast has been placed in the homes where it was most needed.

Following Mr. Gray's talk, the business of the Club was transacted. It was found that money was needed in the treasury and the following committee was appointed by the President to formulate plans for raising money: Mrs. W. M. Axley, Mrs. W. B. Gartrell, and Mrs. H. G. Elkins.

Mrs. C. W. Savage, chairman of publicity and roll call of the American Red Cross, and chairman of the Christmas Seal sale, presented this cause and asked for the co-operation of the club in making this drive a success. In view of Mr. Gray's talk and the figures presented showing the great amount of work done by the Red Cross in our own midst, it would seem that no one could fail to respond when solicited.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered Mrs. W. E. Studstill for having printed the club programs for the year 1931-32.

The program for the afternoon was in charge of Mrs. J. W. Davidson and the topic for study was "The Life and Works of Sidney Lanier," and also a letter from a personal friend. This friend, Oliver Orr, of Macon, Ga., told of the more intimate details of the life of the author than are usually found in members. The following delightful numbers on the program were taken from the works of Lanier: Reading, "The Marshes of Glynn," by Mrs. W. B. Gartrell, and vocal solo: "Into the Woods My Master Went," by Mrs. H. H. Keener.

The next meeting of the club will be held on Wednesday, November 18th, which is the third Wednesday.

Bankruptcy Papers Filed By Murphy Man

J. W. Davidson, Murphey, has filed papers for voluntary bankruptcy in the office of J. Y. Jordan, Sr., Clerk of the United States district court, at Asheville, N. C., according to a news dispatch in the Asheville Times. Mr. Davidson has listed his liabilities at \$60,609.06, while his assets are placed at \$9,946.15.

Mr. Davidson has conducted a gents and boys furnishings store in Murphey for many years, and was interested in Griffith's, Inc., a ladies' and children's ready-to-wear store which closed its door a little over a month ago. He was also a stock holder and director of the Cherokee Bank, which closed its doors on October 3rd.
